



West Virginia GOP Poll Results

Capito should be nominee 63-22% (uninformed ballot test)

Capito should be nominee 38-46% (informed ballot test)

Bailouts least popular aspect of Capito's voting record

POLLING METHODOLOGY

Our philosophy about which population to use depends on the election, but we are generally comfortable with a “likely” model (as opposed to a “registered” model) for most elections. For this poll, we chose a sample of West Virginia households for an automated poll who indicated that (1) they were Republican or Independent, and (2) were “very likely” or “somewhat likely” to vote in the Republican primary. 499 Republican/Independent respondents met this screening criteria and answered all 12 questions.

The poll was conducted February 6-7. The margin of error, with a 95% confidence interval, was 4.4%. 53% of the respondents were female (47% were male), and the geographic breakdown of the respondents was as follows: 35% from the 1st Congressional District, 36% from the 2nd Congressional District, and 29% of the 3rd Congressional District (these were the approximate breakdowns of registered Republicans by US House district).

Question 9: If you knew that Congresswoman Shelly Moore Capito voted for a \$300 billion bailout of Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac, for massive expansions of government-run health insurance, voted to increase the debt limit by \$2.4 trillion and repeatedly voted to continue funding for wasteful earmarks like an Exploratorium in San Francisco, would that make you more or less likely to vote for her?

Comments:

- Before aspects of Rep. Capito’s voting record are discussed, she starts off very with strong support among likely primary voters, with very little “gender gap” and with the overwhelming support (74%) from her district;
- Rep. Capito’s support falls off, but is still an absolute majority, among “very conservative” respondents.

Comments:

- While Rep. Capito starts off very with strong support with likely primary voters, there is a 6 point “gender gap” with regards to the impression primary voters have of her: men are more favorable towards her;
- Her favorability is about 15% higher within her Congressional district;
- Similarly, her favorability is very strong across the ideological spectrum.

- Her voting record with regards to abortion hurts across the board, and it hurts her slightly more outside of her congressional district.

Comments:

- Rep. Capito's record on spending hurts her the most. Curiously, a gender gap surfaces here: women are 10% less favorable towards this aspect of her record than men are;
- Curiously, the extent to which this issue hurts her does not change much within or without her congressional district.

Comments:

- Rep. Capito’s record on labor related legislation hurts her nearly as much as her spending record does, with the damage to her electoral viability strongest outside of her congressional district. Even within her district, she is nearly 2:1 “underwater.”

Comments:

- After aspects of Rep. Capito’s voting record are discussed, her support plunges 10% more among women than with men, although she is “underwater” with both genders;
- Her support also goes “underwater” outside of her congressional district by an absolute majority. Even within her district, less than 50% of primary voters would vote for her against an unnamed opponent;
- Among various ideologies, her support plunges; the amount of plunge is slightly more pronounced among “somewhat” and “very” conservative primary voters;
- **Among the 49% of respondents who described themselves as “very conservative”, Rep. Capito trails a “more conservative” opponent 27-61%.**

Comments:

- The aspects to Rep. Capito’s record that were presented to respondents hurt her image, although she still has a favorable impression among an absolute majority of voters;
- Rep. Capito’s image is hurt the most in District 1 (Rep. McKinley’s district), while in District 3 (Rep. Rahall’s district), her favorability drops to just below 50%. She maintains a solid favorability rating within her congressional district.
