

North Carolina 9th Congressional District Poll Results

POLLING METHODOLOGY

For this poll, a sample of likely households for an automated poll was chosen from the population registered to vote in the 9th Congressional District of North Carolina and there were 350 completed responses to eight poll questions.

The survey was conducted May 21-24. The margin of error, with a 95% confidence interval, was 5.2%. The demographic breakdown of the respondents was 74-18% white/black (9% "other"), while the party registration of respondents was 43-34% Democratic/Republican (23% Independents). The geographic breakdown of the respondents was as follows: 10% from Cumberland County, 31% from Mecklenburg County, 14% from Robeson County, 18% from the other rural counties, and 27% from Union County (*The explanation of the boundaries of these regions is graphically depicted in Exhibit A at the end of the poll analysis*).

SUMMARY

JMC Analytics and Polling independently conducted this poll. There are two main takeaways: (1) President Trump has maintained his popularity in this district relative to his 2016 performance, and (2) while this is a Republican leaning district with a long Republican pedigree, a generic Republican preference is contradicted not only by the narrow margin of last years (undecided) Congressional race, but also by the narrow margin by which the current Republican nominee leads for this fall's special election.

In the 2016 Presidential election, the district favored President Trump 54-43% (57-40% in the Charlotte area and 51-48% in the rest of the district). This poll shows that level of popularity has remained largely intact with a 55-39% approval rating (58-37% in the Charlotte area and 51-42% in the rest of the district). Republicans nearly unanimously support him 87-10%, while blacks disapprove 74-11%, as do white Democrats by a 57-41% margin. The "tie breaker" is white Independents, who approve of his performance 54-42%. And while there is a modest gender gap, there is more substantial variation in support depending on the age of the respondent.

This is a district with a long history of electing Republicans; accordingly, voters by a 52-41% margin favor a generic Republican over a generic Democrat. Republican voters favor a Republican candidate 82-13%, as do white Independents by a 58-39% margin (white Democrats favor a Democratic candidate 57-35%). Charlotte voters want a Republican 59-36%, while the rest of the district favors a Democrat 49-41%.

For both last year's race and its rerun this year, however, the Republicans' challenge is that a noticeable number of voters tend to pick and choose their candidates instead of voting a straight ticket, so candidate quality matters. To illustrate, in last year's Congressional election, voters by a statistically tied 41-40% margin wanted Democrat Dan McCready to win. And while Republican defections were minor (they favored Harris 71-9%), white Independents favored McCready 45-39%, while white Democrats did 58-28%. Similarly, the Charlotte area's preference for Harris (48-37% in the poll/51-47% in the 2018 race) was almost counterbalanced by Democratic margins in the rest of the district (45-30% for McCready in the poll/53-45% in the 2018 race).

Even with a different Republican nominee in this year's rerun of the 2018 contest, Republican margins aren't secure enough to count on this race as a definite win. Dan Bishop only has a 46-42% lead over McCready. His margin among Republicans (79-12%) is similar to the generic ballot, but he also has noticeable drop-off among white Independents (58-39% in the generic ballot, 46-42% in this year's contest), while McCready has a wide 54-32% lead among white Democrats, which is similar to his 57-35% lead in the generic ballot test. Finally, while Harris carried the Charlotte area 51-47% last year, Bishop's 51-37% lead is nearly counterbalanced by a 48-39% McCready lead in the rest of the district (McCready carried the remainder of the district 53-45% in last year's contest).

In summary, picking a different Republican candidate in this year's rerun of the Congressional contest helps Republicans' chances some, but not substantially enough for them to be assured of victory on Election Day.


